## Greek Project for Julius Caesar

- 1. After doing the Gods/Goddess sheets in class using Edith Hamilton's Mythology, you will be assigned a Greek/Roman God or Goddess. You will be asked to make a poster that depicts your God/Goddess. Each part of the poster will be graded according to its difficulty. A hand drawn picture for example is harder to produce than one you copied from the Internet, therefore it will score better. This is the 1<sup>st</sup> element that you will be asked to have on your poster. It is worth 20 points of your final grade for 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter.
- 2. You will need to include in your poster, your God/Goddess' 2 symbols as gathered from the worksheet from the excerpt of Edith Hamilton's Mythology. Please do your best to find excellent versions of these. You will not be marked down for using magazine photos or ones taken from the Internet. 20 points for this element.
- 3. You will need to include in your poster one advertisement with a picture of your God/Goddess in it. For example, if you have the God Mercury, he is used all the time in the FTD ads at Valentine's Day, because he is a symbol of speed and they are advertising their fast delivery. This is the third element. Worth: 20 points.
- 4. You will need to have a mini research paper on your God/Goddess. It must be 2-4 paragraphs in length and have 3 sources included at the end. You must have three in-text citations (no more than three lines each) from these three sources. This mini research paper should be a description of your God/Goddess and can include information from Edith Hamilton's Mythology as a source. However, you must have two other sources as well as the Hamilton. Do not copy what others have said, but put the bulk of the paper into your own words. This fourth element is worth 40 points. The rubric includes points for hitting the "Build a Paper" sheet, plus all in-text citations and a Works Cited portion.

## Remember:

Your project must be on a poster. You can see from the examples on the wall in class, that creativity counts. The more beautiful and artistic the poster is, the better you will score. You can earn extra credit by doing a mini "presentation" of your poster. See Dr. Williams if you would like the rubric that accompanies the presentation.
