
Activity 1: In-Context Predictions

 Here I might substitute "all" or "complete" for absolute.
- Then, look at the example sentence.
 Ask yourself, do my substitutions from the caption —
 "all" and "complete" make sense in this sentence?
 Yes, "complete" works in the example sentence as well.






